- 6. What could each of these descriptions mean for you?
- Exodus chapters 7-12 (the plagues and Passover) describe some of what God has done to establish the basis of the new beginning for His people. Is there any thing that God has done that particularly impresses you? (The Ten Plagues: www.muncherian.com/ TheTenPlagues.pdf)

- 12. Do any of these gods seem especially weird or foolish?
- 13. Do you think that people today have similar needs and attitudes?
- 14. What significance could these gods of today have for you?
- 15. In the plagues, God's people saw God's sovereignty and holiness displayed. In the Passover meal they needed to trust God. These were valuable lessons about God, our need for God, and the importance of trusting God with our lives. As Christians we know this. Why do you think it is so hard for us to keep living according to the lessons we've learned about God?
- 16. In verse 13, what is the sign and who is the sign for?
- 17. What is so significant about the sign?
- 18. What could it mean for you to have the blood of the Lamb applied to your life?
