

JUDGMENT IN REAL LIFE James 2:1-13



James' Principle - verse 1

1. How would you define the difference between discernment and partiality?

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- 2. How does one gain discernment?
- 3. In verse 1, who is James writing to? How do you respond to that? Does it trouble you? Concern you? Make perfect sense?

James' Illustration - verses 2-4

- 4. Have you witnessed a situation where partiality was clearly demonstrated? How did that affect you? How did that situation turn out?
- 5. What would motivate someone to show partiality? What could we expect to gain?
- 6. Have you ever fallen into the trap of partiality?

James' Reasons - verse 5-11

- 7. What are James' three reasons for not showing partiality? Would you add or subtract from these?
- 8. On a scale of 0 (meaning we're Christian clones) to 10 (meaning we're really different from each other), how would you rate the diversity (not just racial) of Creekside?
- 9. How would you rate the diversity of your personal relationships?
- 10. Thinking about God choosing you (and others) to be a recipient of His love, grace, and mercy—how could that truth (i.e. God choosing) change your attitude towards God, yourself, and others?

James' Application - verses 12,13

- 11. Are there some sins that are less deserving of mercy than others? Are there some people that are less deserving of mercy than others? Are there some sins and/or behaviors and/or attitudes in others that you find hardest to offer mercy to?
- 12. How does faith in God set us free to demonstrate mercy to others?
- 13. Looking back at James 1:1-13, is there anything that strikes you as a new insight or an important principle?
- 14. How can you apply this study to your life this week?
