

SPEECH IN REAL LIFE James 3:1-12



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The Problem of Our Tongue - verses 1,2

- 1. How would you describe the warning James gives in verses 1 and 2?
- 2. Are there situations/circumstances/relationships where you find it easier to "stumble" in your speech? To not "stumble"?

The Influence of Our Tongue - verses 3-5a

- 3. In verses 3 to 5a, how does James describe the influence of the tongue?
- 4. Have you experienced (i.e. please share) situations where the influence of the tongue was used for bad? For good?

The Destructiveness of Our Tongue - verses 5b-8

- 5. In verses 5b to 8, how does James describe the destructiveness of the tongue?
- 6. Have you experienced (i.e. please share) situations where the power of the tongue was used for bad? For good?

The Inconsistency of Our Tongue - verses 9-12

- 7. In verses 9 to 12 how does James illustrate inconsistency? How are these illustrations related to our speech? Are there times when you notice inconsistencies in your own speech?
- 8. What can these inconsistencies tell you about your faith? About your relationship with God?

Processing What James Writes...

- 9. In verse 10 James tell us that "these things ought not to be so." What are "these things"?
- 10. If "these things ought not be so," what should be so? Consider as suggestions: Ephesians 4:29; 1 Thessalonians 5:11. Are there any other "things"?
- 11. In verse 8, James writes that "no human being can tame the tongue." What does he mean by this?
- 12. If "no human being can tame the tongue" (that's us), Who can? How? How could this taming take place in your life?
- 13. What would it look like for you to surrender control of your tongue to God? Consider as a suggestion: Galatians 5:16-24.
- 14. The Christian Jews that James is writing to could see severe persecution coming. Put differently: they were about to get hammered by intense drama in their lives. Given that reality, how might James' warning have been especially relevant to them?
- 15. How does James 3:1-12 relate to James 2 and our relationships with others? How might this be especially relevant given the drama we face in life?
- 16. What immediate opportunities do you have to use your tongue to influence and empower others for good? What would it be like for you do take advantages of these opportunities?
- 17. Are there any parts of this study that you have found especially helpful, troubling, challenging? Are there additional ways you can apply this study in your life this week?
