


Desire Romans 10:1-21





Paul's desire for his people (verses 1-4)

- 1. What would it be like if salvation depended on us and not on what God has already done?
- 2. Thinking through the implications of question #1, why do you think people choose to reject or modify God's offer of salvation in Jesus?

The necessity of faith (verses 5-13)

It's Saturday, 10:00 a.m., and two Creeksiders show up at your door: "Hello. We are from Creekside Church. We're conducting a survey of spiritual interest in Merced. The survey takes about 2 minutes or less. We we're wondering if we might ask you a few questions?"

Below is the Spiritual Survey. Take time to ask each other these questions, share, and discuss your answers.

- 1. How interested are you in spiritual things? 1 2 3 4 5 (1 = no interest / 5 = very interested)
- 2. I'm satisfied where I'm at spiritually right now: yes no
- 3. How would you describe your perspective of God?

4. What is your impression of the following (not the people but the religion or beliefs):

Christians: 1 2 3 4 5 (1 = not favorable / 5 = very favorable)

Muslims: 1 2 3 4 5

Jehovah's Witnesses: 1 2 3 4 5

Mormons (LDS Church): 1 2 3 4 5

Sikhs: 1 2 3 4 5

5. Do you have a spiritual background? yes no

If yes, what is it (i.e. Christian, Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, Sikh, Jewish...):

The necessity of proclamation (verses 14-21)

1. What is the process of proclamation that Paul describes in verses 14 and 15?

Notice that Paul is not teaching about "preachers" (i.e. pastors) being sent but about a process through which God uses all His people to share the good news of the gospel.

- 2. What would happen if we refused to be a part of that process (or at least kept our participation to a "comfortable" minimum)?
- 3. How has God used you in that process?
- 4. How is God using you in that process?
- 5. How might God use you in that process?

- 2. How do you plan to respond to it this week?
- 3. Who do you know who needs to hear what was helpful for you in this study? When will you share this encouragement with them?
