- 10. How might the gospel be perceived as not relevant today? How might the gospel be relevant today?
- 11. Have you ever held back from sharing the gospel (and/or your own relationship with Jesus) because you were concerned about the response you would receive? What were the circumstances? Given the same circumstances (hind sight being better than real time) would you respond the same way?

- 14. Paul's presumption is a bold statement about the crucial significance of the gospel. Jesus presumptive statement (Matthew 28:18-20) is a command for us to share His gospel with others. What can living under this obligation look like in your life?
- 15. If you had to pick just one insight from this study that speaks specifically to you, what would it be? Why? How do you plan to respond to it?
